Summary

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This tank was inspected by Ranger Inspections Ltd. Recommendations and Inspection Intervals are the results of interpreting the data Ranger collected (UT readings) and comments made. For complete details see Rangers Report for Job #22669. The tanks external surfaces were found to be in fair condition.

The cladding covering the insulation was found to be in fair condition with although there were several joints of the cladding which were not properly sealed.

The tank base is in fair condition however there was some dirt, gravel etc. found on the tank floor lip. In addition there is no liner under the tank floor and there is no secondary containment.

The tank's associated piping was found to be properly aligned and well supported.

Recommendations:

The joints of the cladding should be properly sealed to prevent moisture from entering and damaging the insulation. Remove the dirt gravel etc. from the tank floor lip.

Summary

Visual inspection of the tanks internal surfaces revealed several areas with minor mechanical damage to the floor likely from stinging the tank. These areas were marked out for immediate repair and repaired by L&L Oilfield of Lloydminster. The internal piping (risers) were found to be in fair to good condition.

A Magnetic Flux Leakage (MFL) scan was performed by Ranger Inspections on accessible areas of the tank floor with twenty two (22) indications of underside material loss identified. The minimum thickness found was 0.131 inch. The nominal thickness is 0.250 inch. See attached Ranger Report for Job #22669 for complete details.

Recommendations:

Continue the Magnetic Flux Leakage (MFL) scan at the next scheduled inspection.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Inspection Date: June 14 / 2016

The following is a summary of the major findings of the out-of-service inspection performed on Tank # T-107A:

BOTTOM

- 1.) A Magnetic Flux Leakage (MFL) scan was performed on accessible areas of the tank bottom plate. Twenty two (22) indications of underside material loss were identified.
- 2.) Resulting MFL indications were additionally evaluated with ultrasonics (UT). The minimum thickness found was 0.131 inch. The nominal thickness is 0.250 inch.
- 3.) The bottom plate was visually examined for topside pitting. Ten (10) pits up to 0.250 inch deep and one (1) hole were observed throughout the tank bottom. This material loss is believed to be from a stinger and is abrasion material loss; however, for the purpose of bottom calculations the material loss will be treated as corrosion.
- 4.) Inspection was limited on the bottom lap welds due to the presence of water and product.

SHELL-TO-BOTTOM WELD INSPECTION RESULTS AND EVALUATION

- A limited visual inspection was performed on the shell-to-bottom weld internally, due
 to the presence of water and product. Accessible areas were observed to be in
 acceptable condition.
- 2.) Externally, the weld could not be inspected due to insulation.



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FOUNDATION

Inspection Date: June 14 / 2016

- 1.) The foundation was visually examined from accessible areas. The tank was observed to be resting within a slightly elevated, or even with grade, metal ring on an earth and gravel foundation.
- 2.) Vegetation growth was observed throughout the metal ring adjacent to the bottom plate projection.
- 3.) A void was observed beneath the bottom plate around the manway due to the cleaning process.
- 4.) No berm was observed; however, there is a low point in the battery in the northwest corner that would collect any product if it were to leak.

SHELL

- 1.) The shell plate was visually examined and observed to be insulated. Some areas of sealant failures were present around nozzles.
- 2.) Internally, the visual inspection was limited due to product. Exposed areas were observed to be in acceptable condition at the period of this inspection.
- 3.) Random ultrasonic thickness (UT) readings were taken on the first course shell plate. No significant material loss was observed or recorded. Refer to Table A Manual UT Shell Plate Readings Course # 1, for additional data.

NOZZLES AND APPURTENANCES

- 1.) The tank nozzles and appurtenances were visually examined. Inspection was limited due to insulation. All exposed nozzles were observed to be in acceptable condition.
- 2.) Internally, inspection was limited due to product. The manway was observed to have one (1) pinhole and one (1) 6 inch length of corrosion on the toe of the manway neck weld. Refer to photographs.



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FIXED ROOF

- 1.) A visual inspection was performed on the roof externally. The roof was observed to be foam insulated.
- 2.) The gauge hatch seal was observed to be in deteriorating condition.
- 3.) Internally, the roof plate was visually inspected from the bottom. Areas of oxidation could be seen at the period of this inspection.



REPAIR RECOMMENDATIONS

Inspection Date: June 14 / 2016

BOTTOM

- 1.) The following is recommended to allow the tank to return to service for a 5 year run:
 - a.) 18 inch * 8 inch patch covering topside pitting (0.250, 0.110, 0.080, 0.040 inch)
 - b.) 9 inch round patch covering topside pitting (0.150 inch)
 - c.) 6 inch round patch covering topside pitting (hole through, 0.050 inch)
 - d.) Lace weld topside pitting (0.090 inch)
 - e.) 3 separate puddle welds (0.050, 0.040, 0.040 inch)

SHELL-TO-BOTTOM WELD

1.) No shell-to-bottom weld repairs are recommended at the period of this inspection.

FOUNDATION

- 1.) It is recommended to repack the area of the foundation void beneath the manway.
- 2.) Consideration should be given to reworking the foundation so water is directed away from the bottom plate around the entire perimeter of the tank.

SHELL

1.) It is recommended to repair the areas of sealant failure around the nozzles.

NOZZLES AND APPURTENANCES

1.) It is recommended to weld repair the pinhole and corrosion located on the manway neck welds.

FIXED ROOF

1.) Consideration should be given to replacing the gauge hatch seal.

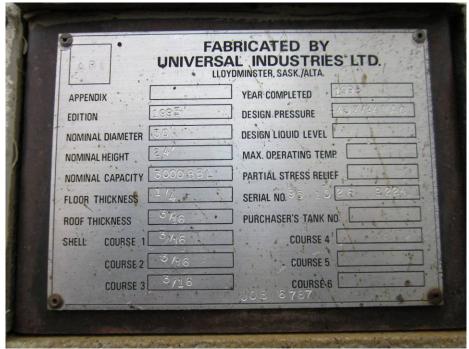

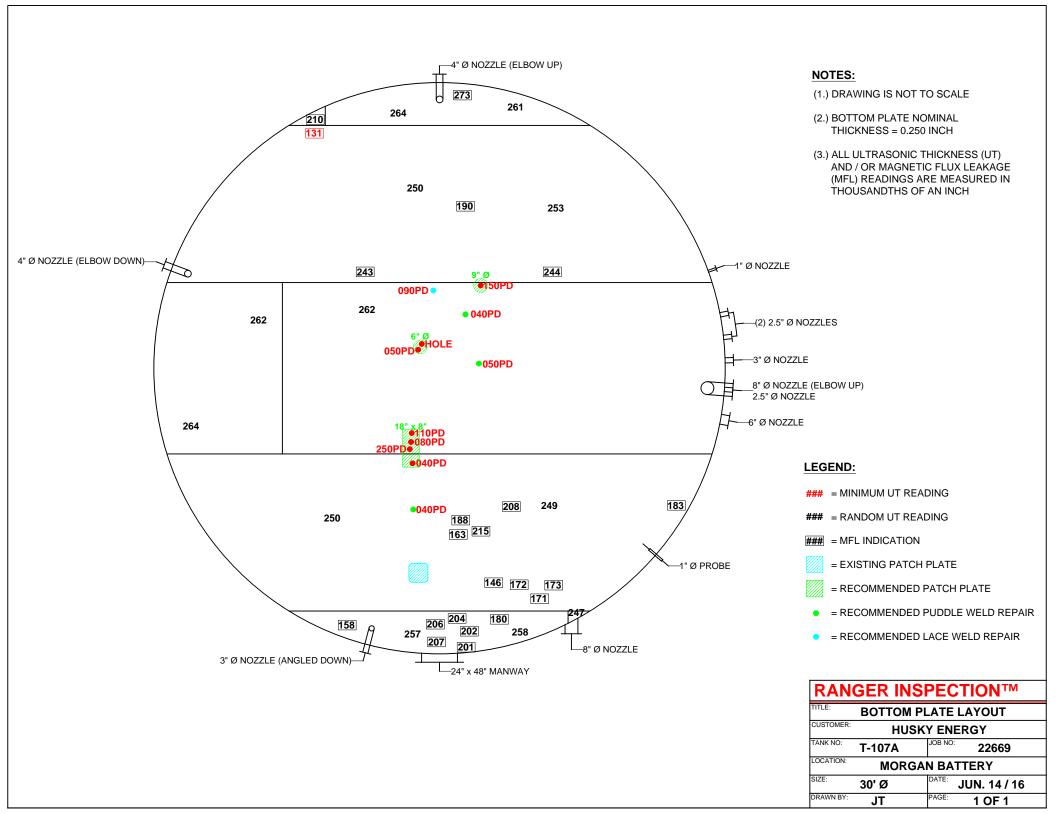

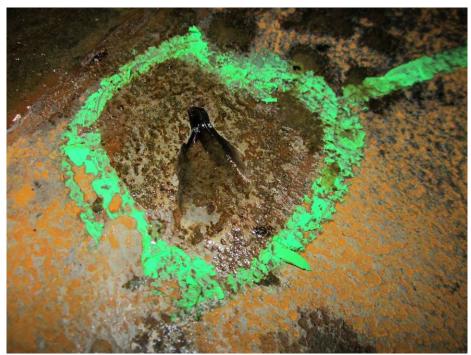

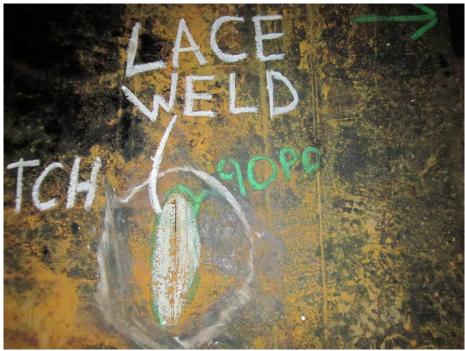

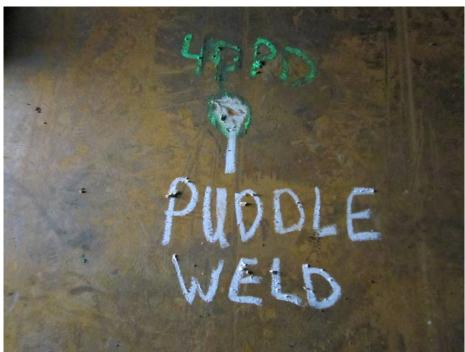

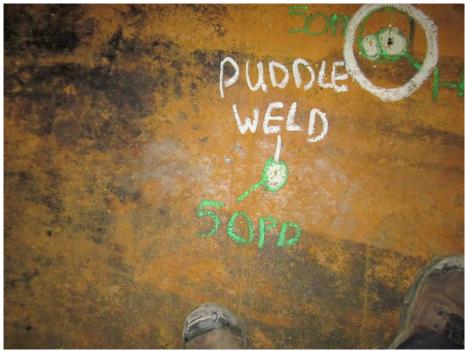


Photograph #20:Lace Weld Repair

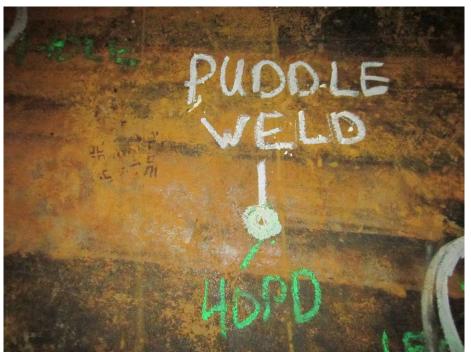


Photograph #21:Puddle Weld Repair

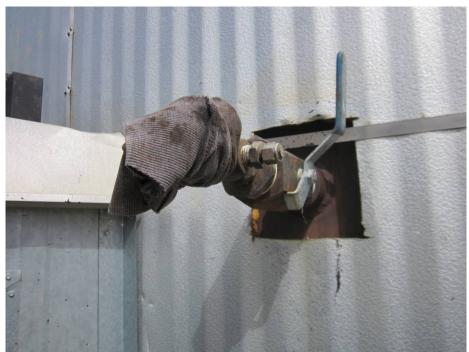

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11. LIMITATIONS TO NDE EXAMINATION

LIMITATIONS TO BOTTOM EXAMINATION

Areas limited or excluded from the MFL floor examination included the shell-to-bottom welds, lap welds, under internal piping, under floating roof leg stands, and the bottom of the sump.

Internal visual examination may have been limited by internal coatings, inadequate cleaning, insufficient lighting, internal column supports, and internal piping.

MFL indications can be falsely triggered by internal pitting, dents, plate buckling, puddle welds, or other previous attachment welds; false MFL indications may be excluded by discretion of the operator.
